

TO THE CITIZENS OF COBOURG:

What does the Church Hockey League mean to Cobourg? From its inception away back in 1934 to the present time it has meant so much not only to the boys concerned and their parents, but to the entire community as well. Unfortunately, there is no material yardstick which would adequately measure the benefits. However, we do know that Church hockey helps to develop sound minds and sound bodies. It teaches sportsmanship ... it teaches the game itself ... it provides healthy exercise ... it teaches courage, skill and coordination --- it also teaches self-discipline. The Church Hockey League also ensure the boys' active connection with Church and Sunday School. To all those, past and present, who have ensured the successful operation of the Cobourg Church Hockey League we owe a great debt of gratitude.

The task of administering this league would be relatively simple if only a few boys were involved, however, there are almost four hundred boys now playing in the Church Hockey League. It is therefore imperative the league be well organized, well supervised, that the boys are under capable direction and are given proper instructions. To fulfil this aim requires the volunteer effort of many men who are willing to give of their time and energy serving, either in an executive capacity or managing, coaching or refereeing games; in other words to ensure that games are well supervised as well as looking after the general welfare of the boys. These dedicated men are making a great contribution to the boys of to-day --- the men of to-morrow.

There is a tendency among some adults to believe that far too much time, attention and money is being lavished on our children and that they should be taught to work out their own recreational problems as was the case in years gone by. I would remind these people that conditions have changed. The automobile and television have changed our daily living habits and in many cases, both parents are employed in commerce and industry. We must also seriously consider these facts, that increased traffic has made streets unsafe for children, that playing on corner lots and vacant fields are a part of the past due to construction of new homes and businesses; also adult life is so over-organized that time is at a premium. All these factors provide opportunity for child misdirection and this problem has so multiplied in recent years that it is imperative for organized recreation to be developed on a year round basis.

On behalf of a very grateful community, I extend to the men of the Cobourg Church Hockey League all honour and praise and to all members of the Cobourg community I urge you to give them your support by attending Young Canada Hockey Night on February 18th.



do so not only as the minister of one of the participating churches but also as a
parent whose son has derived benefit from this program.

In his letters, St. Paul never hesitated to use metaphors taken from the
athletic contest to drive home his point about the strenuousness of the
Christian life. Boxing, wrestling, track and field were all well known to this
spiritual athlete. If our sons in all the churches may learn from their participation
in the weekly games the necessity for striving and working at their faith, much
that is of lasting value has been achieved.

Further, Christianity is not given to dividing a man's make up into separate
compartments. It chooses rather to regard man's total personality and its message
of salvation and redemption is addressed to the entire person. While there is no
undue emphasis upon physical culture to the desparagement of the mind and




The Cobourg Church Hockey League is one of the most important organizations in our community. It provides Canada's winter past-time for 375 boys from six to sixteen among 24 teams in four age divisions. It embraces the villages of Grafton and Baltimore. It is an outing for many youngsters from the Ontario Training Schools for Boys.

Tonight is Young Canada Night-the crowning glory for Church Leaguers, particularly the cream of the crop who will be participating before a jam-packed house. But tonight is of two fold significance. Not only is it the big night of the year for the league but it is the celebration of a quarter century of service to the community. Thus, Cobourg can be doubly proud of the league's efforts this evening, of its optimistic future and of its 25-year history.

Those associated with the game anticipate that Young Canada Night will focus attention on Church League hockey with its many facets, in many ways. They hope to publicize the night and the game, so that every man, woman and child, in Cobourg, will have a new awareness of the game, its characteristics, potentialities, possibilities and advantages; to impress upon parents the work being done for their boys and to encourage them to support the coaches, managers, helpers, executive and referees; to raise funds so that Church League can carry on its vital program; and to encourage parents to become actively interested in the operation of the various teams.

They hope that this one night will draw attention to the values of the game - citizenship, sportsmanship, character-building, respect for authority and respect for the property of others; plus the physical, mental, moral and social aspects.

Church League is the foundation upon which future teams can be built. It costs money to run such a league and every parent and hockey fan should get behind the league and encourage the young players with their applause as well as their money.

These outstanding citizens hope to impress upon everyone that the game also has body-building advantages, not only because of the fact that through it we have lads taking part in active exercise, but because the boys are taught that if they wish to become good hockey players, they must keep in shape, train, eat properly, keep proper hours and keep up their school work; in general to live a clean Christian life and to act as gentlemen. These requisities will stamp him as truly a good citizen, a good Canadian, a credit to his parents, his municipality and above all, Canada.

All of these little things add up to the important total of better boys and a better community. To keep one lad out of trouble is worth all the effort of all the coaches of all the leagues in Canada. All in all, Church League Hockey is a powerful antidote for that poison referred to as "juvenile delinquency." REMEMBER, keep a boy on ice and you'll keep him out of hot water.

Church Hockey is a Family Affair. Don't SEND - - TAKE your boy to the arena. You'll be glad you did.

THROUGH THE YEARS

"Through The Years" By Layton Dodge, Sports Editor, Sentinel Star

1934-35

The first meeting of the Church Hockey League was held the 3rd of December, 1934. St. Peter's, St. Michael's, Trinity and St. Andrew's were represented. Rev. Father Wolff, then a priest at St. Michael's Parish, conceived the whole idea of Church hockey and he presided at the original meeting.

Three groups were formed, the age limits to be — 20 and under; 18 and under; and 16 and under. Bob Jackson was elected president. Other officers were A. Platt, W. M. Leiper and E. J. Holmes.

It was decided the league would be governed by the rules and regulations of the OHA pertaining to number of players to take part in each game and playing of games. Eleven teams comprising 125 boys took part in Church League the first year.

Indicative of the keen competition between the teams, disputes naturally arose at times concerning lawful goals, age limits of players, etc. These points were ultimately ironed out. Like any hockey league they had their financial troubles but it is noted the league ended the season with a favorable balance. A Board of Trustees in charge of trophies was named consisting of Johnny Hutton, Father Wolff and a Rotary Club representative.

1935-36

Fred Hempstead of Trinity was elected president; Ed Campbell, vice-president and registrar; Thomas Holmes, secretary; Oland Burnham, treasurer. Other prominent figures were Murray Gordon, Russell Manning, John Bolster, George Campbell, Bill Leiper, C. Jones.

Colborne entered a team in the junior grouping. Referees for this season were Kent Payne, Arch Campbell, Joe Bulger, Rex MacCoubrey, E. McFadyen, Bill Medhurst, Max Galdi, H. Comrie, Joe Freeman, Hoot Gibson, V. J. Butler.

In the early days of Church Hockey the operation of the schedule often depended on weather and consequent ice conditions. Now with artificial ice, Church League is independent of weather conditions, an important change for the better.

1936-37

Ed Campbell took over as president. Other executive members were E. J. Holmes,

Jess Medhurst, J. W. Burt and R. W. Burnham. A Brighton junior team was the only new entry. The Kinsmen Club advised they would supply transportation for out-of-town games and would also donate a trophy for the Bantam group.

The list of referees this year included Ted Rollings, Hoot Gibson, K. Payne, Charlie Johnson, Ken Goody, Joe Bulger, Rex MacCoubrey, E. McFadyen, D. Clark, Percy Baker, George Elliott, R. D. Rogers, Charlie Henderson.

1937-38

E. J. Holmes stepped into the presidency. New referees named were Lyle Pearce, Harry Grey and Cecil Hie. Chief of Police Bill Carey took a great interest in Church Hockey which he felt built good character and sportsmanship.

He expressed a wish to donate a cup to be competed for annually and to be awarded to the most valuable player to his team. Qualities to be considered in making the award were good sportsmanship, playmaking ability, general ability (puck carrier, passing puck, defensive play), real value to his team.

1938-39

Harold Winter was authorized to interview Conn Smythe of Toronto Maple Leafs about sending someone down to Cobourg on opening night. Soft ice conditions caused many protests and disputes during this season. Fred Goody of St. Peter's Midget B team was awarded the Carey most valuable player Cup for 1939.

1939-40

Harold Winter headed the Church League in 1939-40. Other officers named were R. E. Burns, vice-president; M. A. Hewson, secretary; E. Campbell, treasurer. Brighton team folded but Grafton entered in their stead.

Murray Gordon's statistics assisted the executive in deciding the winner of the Carey Cup. The voting resulted in "Scotty" Murie of St. Andrew's Juveniles being awarded the Cup. Mr. Murie later became a member of the RCAF and won a decoration. A committee was appointed to investigate the cost of building and maintaining an open air rink.

1940-41

Officers elected for the season were: Murray Gordon, pre-

sident; E. Campbell, vice-president; J. W. Burt, 2nd vice-president; M. A. Hewson, secretary; R. Timlin, treasurer.

Dr. Brett, secretary of the junior OHA club, was present at this meeting and he assured the Church League that the Junior OHA club was anxious to co-operate in every way with the Church League. They said they did not want to use any more Juveniles than could be used without injuring the arrangements of the Church League.

Winners of the various trophies were: Boundy-Holmes Cup — Trinity Midget B; Kent Craig Cup — St. Peter's Midget A; Kinsmen Cup — St. Andrew's Bantams; Cowie Cup — Trinity Juveniles; Carey Cup — Terry Byrne of St. Peter's Juves.

1941-42

President Ed Campbell reported that three heated rooms would be provided at the rink for the use of Church League teams. Rev. Nugent inquired whether it was a rule that the boys must attend church or Sunday school to become members of the hockey teams. He was told that such a prerequisite was desirable but such a rule was impossible to enforce.

Trophy winners were: Boundy-Holmes Cup — St. Peter's Midget B; Craig Cup — Trinity Midget A; Kinsmen Cup — St. Peter's Bantams; Cowie Cup — St. Michael's Juveniles; Carey Cup — Bill Hessin of St. Peter's Midget B team.

1942-43

The Juvenile series was dropped this year. It was decided that the winner of the Carey Cup should pass annually from one group to another. Ron Whitefield of St. Andrew's Midget A team won the Carey Cup. Winning teams were St. Peter's Midget B team, St. Peter's Midget A club and St. Michael's Bantams.

1943-44

W. H. Skitch was named president, others on the executive being E. L. Burns, M. A. Hewson and E. Campbell. Mayor J. D. Burnet donated two trophies, one for the cleanest player and the other for the player showing the most improvement during the season. Jack Jamieson of Trinity Bantams was awarded the prize for the cleanest player and Ken Wilcox of St. Peter's Bantams the prize for showing the most improvement. The Carey Cup went to Jack Elliott of St. Peter's Bantams.

1944-45

W. Barr accepted the presid-

ency. E. Campbell, W. H. Skitch and M. A. Hewson were other executive members. The Cobourg rink was closed when a post supporting the roof gave way. Playoff games were transferred to the Baltimore rink. Mayor Roy Dodge donated a prize for the most improved player and it was won by Don Goody. Garth Douglas took the Carey Cup.

1945-46

Fred Kerr stepped into the president's chair. G. R. Campbell took over as president in December. M. A. Hewson, J. Burns and A. Winter served on the executive. The Carey Cup was awarded to M. MacMartin of Trinity.

1949-50

The new artificial ice Cobourg Memorial Arena was constructed. Bob Cooper organized referees, goal judges and timekeepers. Jack Chapman chose Neil Cane of St. Andrew's Midgets as the winner of the Carey Cup. Team trophies went to St. Michael's Juveniles, St. Andrew's Midgets, St. Peter's Bantams and St. Andrew's Pee Wees.

1950-51

Art Perfect headed the executive this season. Ed Campbell, Father Maher, Jack Chapman and Bob Cooper also served. Don Macklin requested that referees clamp down on rough play as teaching the youngsters good sportsmanship from the beginning would help them not only in hockey but throughout their life. The Carey Cup was awarded to Jim "Sleep" Dawe.

1951-52

Officers elected were J. Jamieson, president; Ed Patton, vice-president; Father Maher, treasurer; Art Perfect, secretary. Mayor J. D. Burnet donated a trophy to the CCHL to be awarded to the player with the most points for the year.

1952-53

Taking over as president was Bill McCaig. Bill Fennell, Herb Arbuckle and J. B. Ewart were other officers with Mrs. George Spalding, Sam Stevenson and Fred Franklin as official scorers and timekeepers. The first Young Canada Night was termed very successful by president McCaig.

1953-54

President was Fred Brooks; vice-president, Bill Thompson, secretary and treasurer, Bill McCaig. Winners of cups were: Carey Cup — J. Twitchett; Kerr Trophy — Chuck Chidley; Ewart Cup — Lawrence Galley;

Brooks Cup — R. Talbot.

1954-55

Officers named were Bill Bayman as president, Les Stevenson as vice-president; Frank Menzies as secretary and W. J. McCaig as treasurer. Art Martin took over as secretary due to move to Frank Menzies.

1955-56

Meeting approved holding Young Canada Night on February 17. Herb Galley, Neil Cane, Bill Bayman, Bill McCaig and Art Martin were put in charge of various committees for the night. It was also decided that a registration fee of \$1.00 be collected from every player to set up a trust fund separate from the regular Church League finances to be used to compensate for medical expenses to any playing member.

1956-57

Lt.-Col. Bill Peace was president this season with George Dawe, Bill McCaig, Art Martin and Neil Cane as other officers. Jim Williams agreed to act as public relations officer and it was largely through his efforts that Young Canada Night was the most successful ever.

3,000 fans attended. Bob Pulford and Jim Morrison of Toronto Maple Leafs were special guests and they chose the most outstanding players. Cobourg winners were Ray Chapman and Hughie Williams. In the games, Scarborough Atoms defeated Cobourg Mites 8-1, the local Pee Wees blanked Peterborough 8-0, Cobourg Bantams nipped Oshawa 2-1 and Oshawa Midgets took a 6-4 win over Cobourg Midget All-Stars.

All Church League officials and helpers did a marvellous job in putting Young Canada Night across to the public.

1957-58

Stan Williams accepted the presidency. Vice-president was George Dawe; treasurer, Clarke Sommerville; secretary, Art Martin; publicity, Jim Williams. The Ontario Training School entered 3 teams and a Grafton Bantam entry was also accepted. A vote of confidence was extended to the All-Star coaches, John Ryan, Art Jones, Bill Rollings and Bill Bayman and Ken Medhurst.

Exceeding the turnout of the year before, 2300 fans packed Cobourg Arena for Young Canada Night. Special guests were defenceman Bobby Baum and goalie Ed Chadwick of Toronto Leafs. Cobourg winners of autographed sticks were Billy Ryan, Blaire Sayers, John Anderson and Tom Dingwall. Cobourg teams divided 4 games, Cobourg Mites defeated Trenton 4-1, Pee Wees downed Oshawa 3-2, Peterborough Bantams rolled up 6-1 count against the locals and Peterborough Midgets shutout Cobourg 3-1.

1958-59

Stan Williams was re-elected president. Al Tremblay, Clarke Sommerville, Art Martin and Lloyd Lang were named to the executive. The league was swelled to 24 teams with the additions of Baltimore Pee Wees, St. Mikes B's Mites, St. Mikes B's and Trinity B's in the Pee Wee series. Vince Massey moved that a program be printed to commemorate the 25th year of Church League Hockey and be distributed Young Canada Night.

What future awaits the CCHL? Young Canada Night appears headed for a new record in popularity. Here's hoping the next 25 years of Church League will be successful as the first quarter of a century.






1. I will not smoke.

Only by abiding by these rules can the aims of the Cobourg Church Hockey League be fulfilled.

1. To teach fair play and good sports-ship.
2. To teach the importance of school work.
3. To help boys become good citizens.
